Dear friends,

Some fly to Krakow or to Casablanca, but I have no need for an airplane or a passport in order to discover my origins. My antecedents, the Rivlin family, lived and worked in Jerusalem. Here they taught and were taught. Here they opened businesses and founded neighborhoods. Though ancient Jerusalem is not just the destination for the trail of my personal family history. In this place occurred the Binding of Isaac, and stood King David's capital. It is here the paratroopers stood and wept alongside the stones of the Western Wall.
